



a note from

Many years ago, and the emphasis for sure is on "many years ago," I used to be an avid cross country runner in middle school and high school. I very much enjoyed this sport because while part of a larger team, the real goal was to have better self improvement and a lower mile time every race. We had a wonderful greenway in Maryville, TN near the high school which was where our cross country meets happened when it was our high school's turn to host the meet.

Most of the course followed along a lovely crystal singing river, which the wide and winding greenway followed for three miles. However, there was one narrow section over a long bridge which was a bottleneck when several hundred people tried to run across it at once. That bridge was a notorious part of the course known for elbow jabs, stepped-on shoes, tripping runners, and sometimes an unfortunate collision when too many runners tried to be in the same spot.

Our coach's solution to the problem was a phrase he repeated time and again before every race in preparation for the close contact of runners on the narrow bridge. He would also yell it as we ran across so we wouldn't forget, "You have got to let them know you are there! You got to let them know! Get your elbows out!" It was great advice, a reminder to own the space we occupy, put some elbows out, and be bold enough to let other runners know where we were. Though I have long since stopped running miles on end, the life lesson has stuck with me and strangely has been good advice in recent years for thinking about the church, "You got to let folks know you are there, you got to let them know!"

When I think about this last month and looking forward to August, we are doing fantastically well following my coach's advice, except for us, it is letting the community know Salem Presbyterian is here: loud, and visible and doing the work of the Lord! In this month alone, our church has been represented out in the community at a baseball game and a jazz concert. Reed and the Salem Choral Society gave us a patriotic concert in our church which became standing room only, and Kitty led a class on Advance Directives which helps families and relatives far beyond our church.

Our youth have been ambassadors for the church all over Salem and Roanoke, led by pastor Janet's mini-missions with faithful volunteers. We were visible in the courtyard the week of VBS every morning and afternoon, loudly singing songs, learning Bible stories, and playing games. We got to invite some visitors into worship and make a big noise with a Bluegrass Sunday, and that's not counting all the other ways, like Lemonade on the Lawn and our normal fellowship, worship, and missions we support, where we get to make a little noise on our particular street corner.

While we may not see an immediate effect of doing things visibly out in the world in terms of attendance, we can't forget that anytime we let folks know who we are outside our walls, or invite folks in with special services and events, it makes a huge difference in our viability. It gets folks around us talking and gives a few more adjectives to describe us rather than the historical church on the corner. We are the church that, "fill in the blank!"

In fact, just the other day, right down the street from us at Frank's pizza while I was having lunch, one of our neighbors said to me, "You're the minister of that church which gathers out front on Sunday mornings and has cupcakes. I saw y'all out there several weeks ago." I explained to him that this is not always our norm, but just one of our various celebrations this summer, and that we are a church that likes to celebrate what God is doing at Salem Presbyterian. I'll admit, I never considered being branded as the "cupcake" church, but there are far worse things to be known for in the community. The point is, somebody saw and noticed what we are doing to the extent they wanted to say something about our church. Couldn't make a preacher's heart happier.

Though we are not done with our outdoor festivities this summer, hearing feedback like this and being visible to the community only gets me more excited for another opportunity to do just that! Don't forget, on Friday, August 18, we are having a band come to our front lawn and they will put on a free outdoor concert for our church and the community around us.

I'm happy to say that for this Inreach fellowship event, we even had to get an official "noise ordinance" permission slip because this band will definitely let folks know we have much to celebrate at our church. Anytime a church has to get a "noise ordinance" it means we are doing bold things, so let's make a little noise and be proud of it! I hope you can make it a point to come on Friday, August 18, and if so make sure you bring a folding chair and even some dancing shoes, if that is your thing. It will be a great evening, and as we attend and appreciate a good band outside our church just remember the words of my coach, "You've got to let them know you are there!"

As always, it is a joy doing ministry together!

TICK TALK Guarding Against Lyme Disease

Summer is here, and that means many of us are spending more time outdoors. While the exercise and fresh air are great, beware that ticks are lurking about to spoil your fun. Protect yourself from these pests and Lyme disease by arming yourself with the following information.

Lyme disease, named for the town of Old Lyme, Connecticut, where the disease was first recognized, is a bacterial infection carried primarily by the tiny deer tick, which are about the size of a sesame seed or the head of a pin. To contract Lyme disease, an infected tick must bite you. The bacteria enter the skin through the bite but take approximately 48 hours to make their way into the bloodstream. Therefore, hasty removal of a tick can help prevent infection. Once infected, however, the disease can be difficult to diagnose because symptoms are often vague and may mimic other illnesses. Here's what to look for:

- Flu-like symptoms including fever, chills, fatigue, headaches, swollen lymph nodes, stiff neck, joint pain & muscle aches.
- Red rash (occurs in 70-80% of cases), generally starting at the bite site, which changes from a small red bump and expands over time, forming an area resembling a "bull's-eye," a red outer ring surrounding clear skin and a red center. Itching of skin may also occur as the rash spreads.

<u>Early treatment is critical.</u> If you experience similar symptoms in the days or weeks following an outdoor excursion, be sure to tell your doctor that there is the possibility an infected tick has bitten you, even if you never saw a tick. If diagnosed early, treatment with antibiotics will halt the disease. If the infection remains untreated, complications involving the joints, heart and nervous system can develop.

Be on the Lookout

Symptoms in the weeks or months after being infected may include:

- severe joint pain and swelling (most commonly located in the knee)
- irregular heartbeat
- dizziness
- shortness of breath,
- temporary paralysis of one side of the face known as *Bell's palsy*

- numbness, weakness, or tingling in limbs
- memory loss
- difficulty concentrating
- changes in mood or sleep habits

Let's Talk Prevention

When outdoors, especially if walking in wooded or grassy areas:

- Wear long pants and sleeves. Tuck long pants into socks and wear shoes or boots, not sandals. Light colored clothing is best since ticks show up more easily and can be removed.
- Use EPA-approved insect repellents. Apply a 10-30% concentration of DEET to skin and clothing, socks and shoes. A 10% concentration is effective for about 2 hours. Use caution, chemical repellents can be toxic. Do not apply to hands, especially those of infants and young children, or directly to face.
- Check yourself, your children & pets for ticks. Once inside, remove clothes & inspect skin, especially in the hair and on scalp, in & around ears, under arms, inside navel, between legs and upper thighs, and back of knees. Always shower and shampoo after being outdoors since ticks often remain on skin for several hours before attaching themselves. Be sure to wash all clothing.
- If you find a tick, gently remove with tweezers, grasping it close to the skin by the head, not the belly, and pulling with a steady upward motion without twisting until it releases from the skin.
- Try not to crush the tick, which could expose you to bacteria and infection. DO NOT use Vaseline or fingernail polish. Wash area and hands well with soap and warm water, apply rubbing alcohol or antiseptic & watch for signs of redness or change during the next month.


Vacation Bible School
