

Souper Bowl Sunday!

All donations will be given to the Salem/Roanoke County Food Pantry.







The church season of "Lent" is soon to begin, and depending upon one's experience in the church this word "Lent" could mean several things. If your mind goes first to dryer vents, staticky sweaters, or something you have loaned in the past tense to a friend, you are not alone.

In church lingo, however, Lent is simply a season where we mark the forty days before Easter as a time for spiritual reflection, study, and preparation for Easter.Not all denominations observe this season, but for the ones who do, it is usually a time of fasting in some form. Often this is a literal fasting from certain types of food, as some traditions avoid the more savory foods like meat or sweets in preference for simple and basic meals, a reflection of the forty days Jesus fasted in the wilderness.

Others take this fasting to be a self restriction in some other aspect of life, as one friend told me last year they were fasting from social media. Instead of scrolling before bed, in that time they would read a chapter of scripture before bed.

Others still have interpreted Lent as not a time to give something up, but a time to add something to our lives which helps us follow God more closely and notice the world more intently. My sister, for example, during Lent posts a poem on social media each one of the forty days as for her, finding and posting a poem enlivens her faith and the poems are also a benefit to others. However you choose to observe Lent, the goal is to focus on some part of our day which reminds us of our need for God and keeps us spiritually grounded.

As a church, there are a few exciting and thoughtful ways we will be marking the season to help us navigate these forty days as a community! We will begin the season of Lent in traditional form with an Ash Wednesday service on February 14 at 6:30 PM in the sanctuary. Yes, nothing says "Happy Valentine's Day" quite like remembering your mortality, and there will also be a Wednesday night dinner at 5:30 PM like normal for all who would like dinner before the service.

If you've never been to an Ash Wednesday service, we are "marked" with ashes and a sign of the cross usually on our foreheads hearing the words "We are dust and to dust we will return" as a sign of humility toward God and one another. It's a powerful service, and a different kind of worship service from any other type we have throughout the year.

Alongside the traditional Ash Wednesday service, we will also be having "sidewalk ashes" for our church and community in front of the church from 11:30 AM-1:00 PM on February 14 for all who would like ashes and a blessing. While sidewalk ashes are not as "mediative" as the Ash Wednesday service will be in the evening, it's another good way to observe Ash Wednesday especially if you cannot make it to the evening service for any reason and still would like ashes.

The following Wednesday, February 21, we will begin our Lenten Wednesday night study which will meet for five weeks until March 20. Together, we will be reading a book called, "Lent in Plain Sight: A Devotion through Ten Objects" by Rev. Dr. Jill Duffield. This study will consider ordinary objects Jesus encountered on his way to Jerusalem like dust, coins, thorns, bread, and stones, and in each object, we will hopefully find new meaning in these Bible stories as we consider Jesus' final days. The books will be available for pick up outside Gresham Hall, and I hope you can join this study as we journey through Lent together!

Lastly, for our own individual Lent observances, we will have a set of 40 Lenten devotional cards for anyone to take home for personal use. These Lenten cards offer a short prayer, scripture passage, and devotion every day until Easter. Like last year, they are created by "Sanctified Art" and the theme of this year's devotional cards is "Wandering Heart." This is a great Lenten devotional, especially if you need a little help thinking through your own Lenten practices, and they are great to read on the way out the door in the morning, or conclude the day with a card each evening. The cards will be available for pick up outside Gresham Hall starting February 11, and will be also available in the sanctuary.

However, you make time to consider Lent this year, in the words of our Greek Orthodox friends who call Lent "blessed days" may it be a time of blessing for your own faith as we ponder Jesus' journey to the cross.



Adults

Disciple—"Christian Believer: Knowing God with Heart and Mind" will help students to understand the scriptures more deeply and live out God's Word in their lives. There are daily readings and many participants in this class volunteer to teach several sessions.

Kingdom Living—"Illuminating Lent," part of the "Being Reformed" series will lead learners through an exploration of the Lord's Prayer, its theological understanding and what it means in practical ways during Lent.

Journey On—"The Gospel According to Leviticus" by David Kalas. This study is about finding God's Love in God's Law. Nursery—Bible stories, play time, and activities





DRIVING MISS DAISYWhen Is It Time to Stop Driving?

Remember the popular, Oscar-winning movie, *Driving Miss Daisy*, in which an elderly woman is forced to come to grips with her inability to continue driving safely? She rails against her loss of independence and takes it out on the driver hired by her son. No one takes change easily, and Miss Daisy was no exception. But at some point, we all realize there is a time and a season for everything.

I Can Do It Myself!

To adults of all ages, driving is a powerful symbol of independence. It means we can go wherever we want, whenever we want. We like the spontaneity and freedom it affords. And if we're fortunate enough to live many years, there will come a day when we'll need to turn in the car keys. Being able to determine just when that time has come requires careful examination and self-awareness. There is no "one-size-fits-all" solution.

In the Driver's Seat

As we age, there are physical and mental changes that can affect our driving abilities that include:

- Visual decline
- Hearing loss
- Limited mobility and slower response time
- Loss of muscle strength and flexibility
- Drowsiness due to medications or difficulty sleeping
- Dementia (With any signs of dementia or brain impairment, limit driving and consult a doctor.)

If you are experiencing any of the above, try the following:

The Mayo Clinic's Top 7 Tips for Older Drivers

- 1. Stay physically active- this improves strength, coordination and flexibility.
- 2. *Manage chronic conditions* especially those that may affect driving ability such as low blood sugar related to diabetes or medications that can cause drowsiness.
- 3. Schedule regular vision and hearing tests- these are common age-related problems that make driving difficult. Make sure your corrective lenses are current and if you were prescribed hearing aids, wear them when driving.
- 4. Understand your limitations- for example, if arthritis is a challenge, use a steering wheel cover for an easier grip. (* If mobility is an issue for you, I would also recommend consulting an occupational therapist or a certified driving rehabilitation specialist who can prescribe equipment to make it easier to steer the car or operate the foot pedals.)
- 5. Drive under optimal conditions- avoid nighttime driving and rush hour traffic, or driving when tired or taking medications that impair driving ability. Purchase a vehicle with "user-friendly" features and make sure it is kept in proper working order.
- 6. *Plan ahead* know the route you plan to take and get directions ahead of time to new destinations.
- 7. *Update your driving skills* local community organizations such as A.A.R.P. offer refresher courses for older drivers that may even earn a discount on your car insurance.

Are You An Accident Waiting to Happen?

There is no magic age when one should no longer get behind the wheel of an automobile. Everyone ages differently, and many seniors can continue to drive capably in their seventies, eighties, and beyond while others cannot, and more importantly, should not. Watch for these telltale signs of unsafe driving:

- Driving at an inappropriate speed, either too fast or too slow
- Confusing the gas and brake pedals
- Ignoring or misinterpreting street signs or traffic signals, or failing to yield to cars or pedestrians who have the right-ofway
- Difficulty changing lanes or making turns, especially lefthand turns
- Hitting the curb or drifting across lanes
- Making slow or poor decisions- unaware of pedestrians, bicyclists and other drivers
- Having difficulty turning head, neck, shoulders or body while driving or parking
- Having had one or more minor accidents or close calls
- Becoming anxious, angry or confused while driving
- Getting lost easily, even in familiar areas

"The Grandchild Rule"

Dr. Gary Kennedy, former president of the American Association for Geriatric Psychiatry, boils everything down to "the grand-child rule." Stated as follows, "If a patient's children don't want the grandchildren in the car when the patient is driving, he or she needs to relinquish the keys before hurting someone else's grand-children." When it becomes evident that you or someone you know is a danger, not only to yourself but also to others, it is time to look into alternative forms of transportation.

Inflation is Good

Tire inflation, that is! One in 4 cars has at least one tire that is under-inflated by 8 pounds or more, and low tire pressure is a major cause of accidents.

Distracted Drivers

Auto collisions involving cell phone use (talking and texting) account for more than 1.6 million crashes each year. Teens are more likely to text or talk on their mobile devices while driving but adults do it, too. Never text behind the wheel and keep cell phone conversations, even with hands-free Bluetooth devices, at a minimum!



The Rescue Mission of Roanoke

The Rescue Mission of Roanoke is one of the projects that Salem Presbyterian Church helps support through our Outreach Committee.

With the mission statement "helping hurting people in Jesus' name," the Rescue Mission is a comprehensive crisis intervention center for men, women, and children, that offers life-saving services aimed at transformation and restoration.

Homelessness may be a symptom of varying conditions such as job loss, domestic violence, physical and mental health challenges, and more. Many people think of the Rescue Mission as a place for homeless people to eat and sleep. Besides providing food and shelter, the Rescue Mission attempts to equip and empower people to live independently and intentionally by providing employment training, drug and alcohol recovery, and intensive case management.

The Rescue Mission also offers:

EMERGENCY SHELTER - The Rescue Mission of Roanoke is the only overnight shelter in our region that is open 24/7, 365 days a year. All individuals who are in need and wish to seek their services are welcomed.

MEALS - On average, the Mission serves 600 meals per day. That's breakfast, lunch, and dinner for all guests, with hospitality meals open to the public for lunch and dinner. More than 70 corporate food donors and countless churches (including SPC), organizations, and individuals help make sure that hungry people are fed every day at the Rescue Mission. "A plate of good food, served with a joyful heart in the name of Christ, can be the first step towards healing, recovery, and wholeness."

The G. FRALIN FREE CLINIC FOR THE HOMELESS – This ministry of the Roanoke Rescue Mission serves individuals currently experiencing homelessness and those transitioning into permanent housing in the Roanoke Valley. A volunteer Medical Director and numerous other volunteer healthcare workers provide the care and services an individual needs to improve their quality of life, including primary and preventative care, behavioral health services, medication assistance, dental and vision care, vaccinations and more.

MANNA FOOD PANTRY - Manna is a weekly grocery box distribution program serving struggling families in the Roanoke region. Each food box contains approximately 60 pounds of food including, non-perishable food staples, fresh produce and frozen meats.

THE WAY FORWARD RESIDENTIAL RECOVERY PROGRAMS FOR ADDICTION —Through coaching, spiritual guidance, and education, the program provides participants the tools they need to move from a life of self-abuse and destruction to a life lived in recovery, punctuated by grace.

CLOTHING VOUCHER PROGRAM - Clothing vouchers are offered to shelter guests and individuals/families in the community who are in need.

Outreach Committee Seeks Input From The Church

The outreach committee is responsible for distributing about \$40,000 to organizations that serve others each year. The current maximum distribution is \$5,000. Except for CEDEPCA and our PC(USA) Mission Co-workers, the money is distributed to local organizations that our members are also actively involved in doing "boots on the ground" activities. Some organizations receive general donations to support their on-going programs, and some organizations we support with one-time specific donations. If you would like to have an organization you are involved in considered, please send an email to the church office by March 1 explaining the purpose of the organization, your (and other church members) involvement, and how the money would be used by. The organizations we supported last year included (in no specific order) CEDEPCA, Presbyterian Community Center, Roanoke Asylum Seekers Support Network, Habitat for Humanity, Young Life, Family Promise, Roanoke Area Ministries (RAM), Rescue Mission of Roanoke, Salem/Roanoke Food Pantry, PC(USA) Mission Co-Workers (Betsey Moe and Leslie Vogel), The Giving Garden, SAEM: Ms. Dorsey's Clothes Closet/ACT Packs, and Piecemakers.

Ryan's Case for Smiles

Ryan's would like to thank the church for their support. Our local chapter uses 311 yards of case fabric and 121 yards of border fabric each month to make a total of 450 pillowcases. Our own Lorain Petersen is the master of great deals on fabric. She was able to use the Alternative Christmas funds to purchase 22 bolts (330 yards) of fabric. If you would like to buy fun cotton fabric on your own, please consider purchasing 3 yards of a fabric to minimize waste. If you would like to join the fun of making them, please do so. No sewing experience is required.





Summer Mission Trip

There are five reasons for our work trips...

- To live out God's commandment of loving our neighbors as ourselves
- To help others
- To experience a different cultural setting from our own
- To learn from those with whom we work
- To share the experience of living, working and having fun together

Mission trips are a week of hard work, lots of fun, good friends and an opportunity to do something that makes a difference in the life of another person or family. This summer we will be working through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) and Housing Development Alliance (HDA) in Hazard, KY. The two organizations are working together both for new construction in an impoverished area, and also for flood relief from the summer 2022 floods. We will know more specifically closer to the time of the trip the types of jobs we will be doing, but likely we will be putting in subflooring, installing windows and doors, putting up insulation and sheetrock, painting, and landscaping. The mission trip is open to students entering ninth grade through adults.

We will be staying at First Presbyterian Church of Hazard. We will need to provide our own sleeping bags or linens, and we will cook our own meals. We are asking each person to pay \$100, which will help to cover costs of food, transportation, and supplies. Please speak with Janet Chisom if you have questions, need more information, or wish to sign up to be part of the team. The registration form is on the church website.

Confirmation Class

Walter (Buddy) Lipes Charitable Trust

In 2023, Salem Presbyterian Church received a very generous bequest from long-time member Walter (Buddy) Lipes, who set up a Charitable Remainder Trust in 1997. When Mr. Lipes' widow passed away last year, the church was informed that we were entitled to 50% of the trust assets. After completing lots of paperwork, including releases, indemnification, banking information, and corporate resolutions, the church received several payments totaling just shy of \$300,000. This gift is specified in the trust "In honor of the family of Mr. & Mrs. Walter M. Lipes, Sr." What a blessed and generous gift for our beloved church, and we remember and thank the Lipes and Garst families for their patriarch's wonderful bequest.

After much deliberation in our Stewardship and Finance Work Group, the following recommendation of allocations for this money passed the Session at their June meeting:

- 1) 10% to Outreach, enabling us to help local, regional and international missions to aid our neighbors in need, wherever they may be.
- 2) 25 % to the Building Repair Reserve Fund to replenish funds used to decrease recent operating budget deficits and support near term requests and needs.
- 3) 40% to the Building & Maintenance Endowment Reserve in order to build up and support annual operations distribution as is done for outreach.*
- 4) 25% to a newly established "Lipes Fund," a line in the Endowment for unrestricted use, subject to Session approval.

This gift will be used as the Holy Spirit leads us – to follow in the footsteps of Jesus, loving our neighbors and caring for those in need while we also maintain our historic building on the corner of Main and Market. We are truly blessed in receiving this gift!

*There is a line in the church's Endowment account called the Outreach and Benevolence Fund and 4% of the value of this fund goes directly to our Outreach Committee for distribution annually.
