

MISSION OF THE MONTH: Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity provides safe, affordable homeownership to local families. These homes are not given away for free. The families do pay a mortgage back to Habitat. At zero percent interest, Habitat sells the homes to the homeowners at whatever price makes it affordable to the family which is typically the price that makes monthly payments equal to 30% of their monthly income.

In exchange for this reduced price, the Habitat families go through the entire Habitat program which is a year of homeownership and financial literacy classes. These classes cover a wide variety of topics and prepares the families for this new adventure since none of them have ever owned a home before. The families also agree to give "sweat equity" hours which equals 20 hours per month/per adult on other homes as they wait for their own home and also work on their own home when their job does not interfere. Habitat families also agree to become involved in their new neighborhoods and take part in special projects and meetings through their neighborhood association.

Habitat families are doing all the right things. They work hard, sometimes on two and three jobs. They pay their rent. They are responsible with their money, but for a variety of reasons, they would never be able to qualify for a traditional mortgage. Habitat gives them a way to make this dream a reality and set new standards for their family.

Habitat for Humanity has served the Roanoke Valley for over 30 years. They have built 213 homes, assisted 256 families, and currently average over 10 houses a year.

Habitat has been organizing what they call the "Wall of Many Colors" for a couple of years. It's a way for all members of the congregations to have a small part of the Apostle's Build by signing and placing a board on the inside of the structure. Salem Presbyterian's board was put in place on April 28!



This year we are building a house for Aubrey Wood and her son, Ryden. We will be participating in the Apostle's Build on Saturday, May 6 and Friday, May 12. The work day is 7:30am-2:00pm and we can accommodate up to 12 volunteers per day. No experience is necessary but all volunteers must be at least 16 years old. Habitat will provide all required tools and safety equipment. Volunteers will need to provide their own lunch, a refillable water bottle, and we suggest their own work gloves. Please dress for the weather and wear sturdy closed toed shoes like hiking boots. Volunteers are needed. a note from hris

Friends, I recently spent a week traveling throughout Guatemala with CEDEPCA, which stands for The Protestant Center for Pastoral Studies in Central America. It was a wonderful trip! Many in our congregation have gone before over the years, and CEDEPCA is also thankful for our monetary support we provide as a congregation. This particular trip was a group from our Presbytery of the Peaks along with our neighboring Presbytery of the James. Here is only a small amount of what I saw, heard, and experienced:

First, the beauty. The landscape of Guatemala is stunningly beautiful. There are birds so colorful it would make a red North American woodpecker feel under-feathered. Many of the towns are not that dissimilar, and despite bars on windows, walls, and homemade barbed wire, the houses are joyfully painted loud colors of reds and yellows, and there are creative murals on most streets.

The traditional dress which many proudly wear, contains beautiful hand-sewn weaving, making every garment a true work of art. Walking through the country is like being in a perpetual botanical garden with bright flora and fauna growing everywhere from sidewalks to rooftops. There are also several rumbling volcanos puffing away in the backdrop of daily life. While impressive to see, it also adds frequent natural disasters to the list of challenges facing the local populations.

However, beneath this paradise of beauty, there are so many stories of pain and injustice. A few hours into the trip, we met a pastor and professor named Hector who teaches students at CEDEPCA. He told us about his brother, a journalist who wrote an article which was critical of the government's policies toward the poor during the thirty-year civil war which ended in 1996. That article did not go unnoticed, and soon after, the Army kidnaped Hector's brother in a van, and four hours later dumped his body in a park. Hector told us they considered it a "blessing" that his family had his brother's body compared to the estimated 50,000 people who the government simply "disappeared" and will never be found.

Another day, we spent time at a church called "Jesus is the Way" that CEDEPCA supports along with another group called "Compassion International." The church is one of the few places in the area where children can safely gather to play, sing, and learn about an empowering God. The church also houses a bakery where teenagers can learn to bake bread as a skill to help better their options in the community rather than joining a gang. The young children spoke of dreams of being lawyers, nurses, and architects, and indeed some have gone on to be nurses despite long odds, partly because of the faithful work of this program.

During dinner, the pastor of "Jesus is the Way," Emerson, pointed to a roof top a block away which was the house of the local drug dealer who runs the area. When asked why the police didn't arrest him, Emmerson simply explained the police are on the payroll to provide the drug dealer protection and will do nothing. Still, the church keeps its witness, preaching the gospel, sheltering children, and holding services six nights a week.

Every single day we heard multiple stories to this magnitude of people who have and continue to suffer greatly only because of the cruelty, violence, and greed of a few which exploits most of the very hard-working population. Some of this violence and greed also traces its way back to the actions of our own country, which is a hard historical reality to hear. Indeed, we also learned that all the wealth, land, and power of the country is controlled by twelve families, none of whom actually live in Guatemala.

Despite these tremendous social obstacles, there are other forces at work through a beyond-resilient people. God is working in the midst of these challenges, and the witness of faith and hope we found in those we met speaks to what God is doing. Folks at CEDEPCA and many others are bringing hope, person to person, and believe that change, though it be painstakingly slow and incremental, will create a new future beyond the present realities. When we asked "Where is the hope for Guatemala" our amazing guide, Esvin, without hesitation responded, "In the people."

We saw this hope sharing lunch with a collective of women called "Fraternidad de Presbiteriales Mayas" who receive small business loans through CEDEPCA. One woman uses this small loan to make delicious chocolate, which supports her family and friends who work with her. We saw hope in another collective of women called "Corazon de Mujer" who were tragically displaced during the thirty-year civil war who are now known for the highest quality of weaving fabrics.

The work of God was found in a person named Amy who has created the first-of-its-kind elementary school which began as a humble children's library, also a notion largely unheard of for children. That school, "La Puerta Abierta," was also the recipient of our denomination's Presbyterian Women's "Thank You" offering. Amy has shared the success of her program training rural teachers in a two year program for creating their own children's libraries in rural communities. Twenty years after its founding, La Puerta Abierta rivals any elementary school in the States. Considering education is not free, if a family who attends the school cannot pay, they can donate their hand-crafted wares to the school, which the school then sells to pay the teachers.

For every example of cruelty and a terribly broken system, there are counter-stories of dedicated church workers and locals who refuse to let that be the only defining characteristic of the country. Those we met do not need us to "fix" their country, it is their struggle and future to create. What they do need, however, are partners and ears to hear their stories so we might not only see how God is working beyond our borders, but also become aware of how we as neighbors up north effect what happens down south.

If anyone has questions about the week, or the good work of CEDEPCA, there is much to tell and please don't hesitate to ask! Teresa Auldridge, the chair of our Outreach Committee, also participated in this trip and it was her sixth visit to Guatemala. This trip occurs rather frequently in our Presbytery. If you ever have an interest in going to visit CEDEPCA, as well as seeing what God is doing in Guatemala for yourself, there is a space for you to come and learn, hear, and see.

Sunday School Classes through May 21

The *Kingdom Living Class* is studying about justice. The word is used in so many different ways. Justice can be seeking retribution or vengeance. Justice can be restorative, through forgiveness and grace. Justice can refer to the procedural process. Justice can be for the purpose of deterrence, and rehabilitation. Explore with the Kingdom Living Class what the Christian definition of justice might be.

The *Disciples Class* is using a Bible-based curriculum to study in depth about "Jesus in the Gospels." There are daily readings and many participants in this class volunteer to teach several sessions. The children (Pre-K-5 years, Kindergarten-5th grade), youth (6th-12th grade), and adult *Journey On* classes

SENIOR MOMENT "Normal" or Alzheimer's?

Forgetfulness is common at any age, young and old alike. When I was 8 years old, I misplaced a shiny new pinwheel at my grandma's house and asked her to help me find it. She wisely advised, "Just retrace your steps and see what happens." Sure enough, I searched all the places I had recently been and found my toy behind a chair in front of her picture window. Memory is a tricky thing- and it only becomes trickier as we age!

Not as Quick as We Used to Be

As we grow older, learning and recalling new information slows. We just aren't as quick as we used to be and know it! This prompts us to question our mental capabilities and even our sanity. However, there are many conditions that can cause memory loss including: depression, stress, medication side effects, alcohol use, vitamin B12 deficiency, infection, thyroid disturbances, diabetes, and dehydration. Because these disorders can be treated, it is important to be evaluated by your doctor to see if any apply to you. In doing so, you can reduce or even reverse memory loss.

Use It or Lose It

Age-related memory loss begins to occur after age 50 and most often is *not* associated with Alzheimer's disease. This is good news but better still, there are steps we can take to boost our memories and overall brain health.

• **Exercise regularly.** People who engage in aerobic exercise increase brain volume and cerebral blood flow, do better cognitively, and have improved memories.

• **Play games- all sorts!** Try games that involve strategy like bridge or Scrabble. Do crossword puzzles. Read. Learn something new like a foreign language, playing a musical instrument or taking a course in a subject that interests you.

• **Stay involved**. Get out there with family and friends. Social interaction keeps you sharp!

• Eat a healthy diet. Feed your brain plenty of fruits, leafy green vegetables and omega-3 fatty acids found in salmon, walnuts and flaxseed. Blueberries are being touted as possessing magical powers for their whopping dose of antioxidants.

• Manage stress and get proper rest.

• **DON'T SMOKE!** Smoking deprives your brain of oxygen, which in turn can affect memory.

Forget Me Nots

Recognizing that occasional forgetfulness is a part of aging, we sometimes wonder what is "normal." Have you found yourself in the kitchen wondering what you went in there for, misplaced the car keys, forgotten an appointment or had the name of an acquaintance right "on the tip of your tongue?" Of course, we all have! While these lapses can be frustrating, they are normal. Signs of Alzheimer's dementia involve extreme forgetfulness such as:

• Getting lost in familiar places or can't remember how to get home.

• Forgetting how to do things you've done many times before like bathing, driving, reading a clock, or dressing appropriately.

• Misplacing items in unusual places (putting your wallet in the oven) and losing the ability to retrace steps (can't find your pinwheel).

• Repeating the same phrases, questions or stories in the same conversation.

• Poor decision-making and trouble handling money.

• Increased difficulty completing once simple tasks (following a recipe).

• Mixing up or forgetting common words when speaking or writing.

• Changes in behavior or personality. Withdrawal from social activities.

• Memory disrupts daily activities or relationships with friends and family.

• Others are concerned about your memory.

If you recognize yourself or a loved one in any of the above, please schedule an appointment with a physician now to determine the cause of your memory loss. If it is Alzheimer's, early detection means you'll be able to explore more treatment options, participate in decisions about your care, plan for the future, and maintain your independence longer.

Church Office

While the office costs are a smaller portion of our budget, they are important to the efficiency and management of the church as a whole.

The office budget covers most of our computer and technology costs which includes things like some new computers and equipment, and fees for our outside IT manager. It also covers fees for software, like our membership database, accounting software, payroll software, Zoom subscriptions, website domain and management, and more. As the name would suggest, the office budget covers office supplies. In addition to regular supplies like pens and tape, we also use some more expensive supplies like dry erase markers and batteries. Typically the costs are low individually, but added together, they are significant.

Let's not forget about printing. We pay for a copier lease which has a small increase each year, and we pay a flat rate per print. We use a lot of regular copy paper in addition to more expensive specialty paper for our bulletins and cardstock.

Another significant expense is postage. While we try to use email as much as possible for our communications, we do typically send out mailings to our entire congregation a few times a year and we pay a yearly fee for our PO box at the post office.

The office budget also catches a few other random expenses that just don't seem to fall anywhere else, so we try to plan for those things too.

Emily does her best to budget, negotiate contracts, and price-shop to keep all of these costs as low as possible.
